

John Robert Lyth was the fourth child of Daniel Stringer Lyth, the Verger of St Leonard's Church, and his wife Hannah. The family lived at 49 High Street.

Percy James Cadman was the eldest child of James and Joanna Cadman. His father was a miller and baker and the family lived in Park Road, Hythe.

Susannah Ashdown nee Beaney was born in Hastings in 1780. She was the daughter of William and Ann Beaney. She married William Ashdown on 12 October 1805 in Icklesham. They had at least two daughters.

Margaret Elizabeth Mary Hamilton nee Cragg was born in Stoke Damarel, Devon, the eldest daughter of John Cragg, a Captain in the Royal Navy, and his wife Margaret. She married Thomas Bramston Hamilton there in 1864. She travelled with him as his military postings took him round the UK, to Ireland, Shorncliffe, Sheerness and finally to Bitterne in Hampshire. They had eleven children. According to her daughter Ethel, when asked to dissuade her son Patrick from taking up flying she replied "no one's personal feelings ought ever to interfere with any man's career provided it was an upright and honourable one to follow." Her husband died in the Boer War, as did her sons Alastair, Ernest and Kenneth, and on Patrick's death, she received a letter from George V, offering his condolences on her multiple losses. As a widow, she lived in Hythe, at The Old Manor House in Hillside Road, where she remained until her death.

Patrick Hamilton was the tenth child and youngest son of of Thomas Bramston and Margaret Elizabeth Mary Hamilton nee Cragg. He was born at Bitterne Grove in Bitterne, Hampshire, in June 1882. He joined the British Army, and by

the age of nineteen was a 2nd Lieutenant in the Light Infantry. He served in India, and on his return on leave in 1911 took flying lessons. With a friend, he then sailed for the United States, taking two planes with them. He survived an accident in Mexico, in which his plane fell 100ft. On his return to the UK in 1912, he obtained his flying certificate, and joined the Royal Flying Corps, which had been formed that year. September he and his observer took off in his Deperdussin monoplane from an airfield in Berkshire as part of a large military exercise. Shortly afterwards, the engine cut out, the pilot was unable to control the plane, which started to disintegrate, and both Patrick and his observer were killed in the ensuing crash. A memorial to them both was raised near the village of Willian in Hertfordshire, and there is also a memorial in Worcester Cathedral. They were among the first members of the RFC to die while flying.

Hilda Blanche Moss nee Hamilton was the fourth child of Thomas Bramston Hamilton and Margaret Elizabeth Mary Hamilton, and was born in Sandgate. She married Robert Miles C. Moss in the town in 1899. She died in the local area

Walter Hills was the seventh child of the ten of George Hills, a wool buyer and his wife Catherine. He was born in Hythe. The family lived in St Leonard's Road.

Edward Longly was born in Hythe, the twin son of Henry Longly and his first wife Susan. His mother was buried four days after the twins' baptism on 31 December 1803. His step-mother is buried in plot 559.

Plot 557 Sharpe

Inscription In loving memory/of/Mary Anne/wife of Thomas Sharpe/born at Eton Dec. 18th 1829/died at Hythe/April 19th 1910

Also of Thomas Sharpe/born at Winkfield Berks/May 19th 1838/died at Hythe/October 22nd 1921

Mary Anne Sharpe and her husband, Thomas, had four children.

Thomas Sharpe was the second of the six children of Charles Sharpe, a labourer, and his wife Sarah. His father died when he was a boy. He worked all his life as a gardener, at first in Winkfield, and later in Southgate, near Edmonton, until he retired to Ormonde Road in Hythe.

Annie Eliza Wood nee Miller was the daughter of Isaac and Susan Miller. Her father was a coachman. She was born in Hildersham, Cambridgeshire, but her father moved the family

to Epsom when she was very young. She became an elementary school teacher there, and it was there that she married William James Wood in 1901. Their first child died young, but another was born after they had moved to Hythe.

Plot 559 Longly

Inscription In memory of/Sarah/wife of Henry Longly/who departed this life/December 7th 1858/aged 78 years/left surviving 6 sons and/3 daughters

Sarah Longly nee Brittenden was the daughter of William and Elizabeth Brittenden and was born in Sandgate. She was baptised in Cheriton on 12 March 1780. She married Henry Longly, a tailor, on 10 November 1804. She was his second wife. The family lived in Theatre Street, Hythe. Her stepson is buried in plot 556.

William Brittenden was a mariner. He lived in Stade Street and, in his later years, in St Bartholomew's Almhouse. He did not marry.

Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord

Hannah Mary Cloake nee Revell was the first wife of Thomas Cloake. She was born in Hythe and married Thomas on 17 January 1825 at St Leonard's Church in the town. Both their daughters, their only children, died very young, but they brought up a niece.

Sarah Cloake nee Stickles was the second wife of Thomas Cloake. She was born in Warehorne, Kent and was the daughter of Robert Stickles, a licensed victualler. She married Thomas Cloake on 31 December 1866 at St Leonard's Church.

Thomas Cloake was the seventh child of Nicholas Cloake, a labourer, and his wife Hester nee Hubbard. He was born in Sellinge, but the family moved to Hythe where Thomas became a grocer in Market Street. At the age of sixty-one, he became Prior or Steward of St Bartholomew's Hospital in the town, a position he held until his death.

Effie Castle Dray was the fourth child of Henry Dray and his wife Affry Jane. She lived with her parents all her life.

Henry Dray was born In Folkestone, the son of Henry and Sarah Dray nee Payne. His father was a baker. Henry was apprenticed as a carpenter and joiner and by the time of his marriage he was working in this trade.

Affry Jane Dray nee Castle was the daughter of Thomas Castle, the sexton of St Leonard's Church, and his wife Mary, and was born in Hythe. The family lived in Chapel Street. She married Henry Dray on 26 April 1846. The couple had four children and lived in Theatre Street, Hythe.

Plot 563 Atkinson

Also Bernard, son of the above/died 15. Nov. 1909,/aged21 years

And /Mary Ann./wife of/William/died 9.Sept.1945/aged 80 years

William Atkinson was born in Manchester. After a spell in Lincoln, he and his family settled in Theatre Street, Hythe.

Bernard Lovelock Chittenden was the son of William Atkinson and Mary Ann Chittenden, born in Stanford and baptised there on 29 April 1888. He lived with his maternal grandmother in Hythe High Street.

Mary Ann Atkinson nee Chittenden was born in Aldington. She married William Atkinson in 1892. She and her husband had five children. She kept a general store after she was widowed.

Also of their daughter/Thomasine Rhoda/Maycock/who died 3rd March 1938

Jane Maycock nee Griffey was the second child of Samuel Griffey, a boatman in the Coastguard, and his wife Thomasine. She was born in Anglesey while her father was posted there, but moved with her family to Hythe as a child. They lived at Fort Twiss, and as a young woman she worked as a dressmaker. She married William Maycock in 1856. They had five children. Their daughter Jane (Amos) is buried in plot 132

William Henry Maycock was born in Newington, Kent, the eldest child of George and Jane Maycock. He was baptised on 3 March 1833. His father was a shoemaker in Newington, living at The Blue House in The Street, but the family later moved to Hythe, where George kept an alehouse in the High Street. William became a plumber, painter and gas fitter and lived with his family at 39 (now 84) High Street. His sister Charlotte (Hook) is buried in plot 184, and his brother John in plot 186

Thomasine Rhoda Maycock was the third child of William and Jane Maycock and was born in Hythe. After the deaths of her parents, she remained in the family home where she ran a wallpaper store and paper hanging business.

Maria Beatrice Carter nee Singleton was born in Fleetwood, Lancashire the daughter of James Singleton, a fisherman, and his wife Maria. She was baptised there on 26 July 1874. She married Thomas Benjamin Carter, a soldier, on 1 January 1874, and moved with him to Hythe when he was posted to the School of Musketry.

Thomas Aughton Carter was born and died in Hythe.

Plot 567 Denne

Thomas Denne was born in Wingham, the second child of Robert and Margaret Denne. The family farmed in Langdon, near Dover, and as a young man Thomas took employment as a farm bailiff at Hougham. Later he farmed on his own account at Herne and Woodnesborough. He married Margaret Ann Castle in 1853. They had nine children.

Reginald Embleton Emson was the eldest of the four sons of William Emson and his wife Silvia Moates Emson nee Embleton and was born in Bow. His father died when he was a boy. He became an accountant, in partnership at the firm of Whitcombe and Emson, and was several times president of the society of Accountants and Auditors. He lived with his family in Ilford, Streatham and Norwood.

Louisa Elizabeth Emson nee Kidd was born in Nottingham, the second child of Edwin Moses and Jane Kidd. Her father was a stockbroker. She married Reginald Embleton Emson on 1 September 1881 at All Saints Church in the town. They had four children. After she was widowed she lived with her daughter in Lincolnshire.

Albert Day was born in Hythe and lived there all his life. He became a carpenter and builder as well as an alderman and J.P.

Susannah Day was the elder daughter of John Day, a mariner, and his wife Elizabeth. The family lived in Stade Street, Hythe. She married Albert Day on 11 May 1859 in Ramsgate. The couple had eight children, although four pre-deceased them, and are buried in plot 579. Her parents are buried in plot 133 and plot 731.

Henry Day was the fourth child of Henry and Susannah Day of Christchurch. His sister Charlotte and brother William are buried in plot 576 and his sisters Mary (Marsh) and Elizabeth (Smith) in plot 577

Elizabeth Laidlaw Scott was born in Scotland. She and her husband had five children, three born in London, the final two in Hythe.

John Scott was born on 10 May 1844 in Selkirk, the fourth child of James Scott, a sawyer, and his wife Jessie, nee Hope. The family moved to Galashiels when he was young. He became a carpenter and moved to London, and later to Hythe, where he lived at 5 The Avenue. He died in 1927.

Plot 576 Day

William Day was born in Christchurch, Hampshire in about 1796, the second child of Henry and Susannah Day. The family moved to Hythe where he lived in Stade Street and worked as a grocer. He was married to Maria. He died in 1867

Charlotte Day was also born in Christchurch, the eldest child of Henry and Susannah Day. She too, lived in Stade Street Their brother Henry is buried in plot 572 and their sisters Mary (Marsh) and Elizabeth (Smith) in plot 577.

Plot 577 Marsh and Smith

James Marsh was the son of James and Sarah Marsh of Harbledown, and was baptised in the village on 15 November 1778. He became a sawyer and later a grocer and lived with his family in Stade Street, Hythe.

Mary Marsh nee Day was the youngest daughter of Henry and Susannah Day. She and her husband had a daughter. Her sister Elizabeth is buried with her; her brother William and sister Charlotte in plot 576 and her brother Henry in plot 572.

Elizabeth Smith nee Day was the third child of Henry and Susannah Day of Christchurch. She married Thomas Smith, a former soldier, and they kept a beer shop and lodging house in Maidstone. After her husband's death, she became a greengrocer. The couple had a daughter.

Plot 578 Cornelius

Sarah Walker Cornelius was living in Frampton Road, Hythe at the time of her death.

All the above were among the eight children of Albert Day, a carpenter and builder of Stade Street, Hythe, and his wife Susannah. Their parents are buried in plot 572.

Plot 580 Griffey

Inscription In loving memory of/John Henry Griffey died July 19 1911 aged 63 years

Thy will be done

John Henry Griffey was the grandson of Samuel Griffey, a coastguard, and his wife Thomasine, and was raised by them in Hythe. He became a painter and decorator and married Decima Sarah Webb in 1869. They lived all their lives in Hythe and had eleven children

Plot 581 Monsell

Inscription To the memory of/William Crawford Monsell/who died Dec 27th 1909/(at his father's house Earlsfield Road) aged 36 years

Also John Crawford Monsell/who died July 21st 1924,/aged 81 years

William Crawford Monsell was the second son of John Crawford Monsell and his wife, and was born in London. As a young man he studied medicine and served in the Boer War in the Cape Medical Staff Corps.

John Crawford Monsell was born on 19 February 1843 in Limerick, the son of John Monsell and Martha. He married Louisa Isabella Heacock in 1870. They had three sons and moved to Hampstead. She died on 26 May 1906. As a widower, John lived at 'Endsleigh' Earlsfield Road, where he died.

Plot 582 Chamberlain

Inscription Sacred to the memory/of/Richard Chamberlain/who departed this life/February 4th 1859/aged 80 years and was parish/clerk of this church for/nearly fifty years

Also Martha daughter of/the above/who died December 20th 1858 aged 47

Also of Charles, his son/who died August 19th 1860,/aqed 56

Richard Chamberlain was born in Hythe and baptised in St Leonard's Church on 20 September 1778. He was the son of Charles Chamberlain and Elizabeth nee Rose. He married Martha Illenden on 9 May 1801 in Saltwood. They had six children. He was by trade a bricklayer and lived in Hythe High Street. He was appointed Parish Clerk by Archdeacon Croft. The salary paid was only nominal, but apparently the perquisites from conducting visitors to the church and around the crypt amounted to 'a good round sum'. His wife and four other children are buried in plot 687.

Martha Chamberlain was the fifth child of Richard Chamberlain and his wife Martha. She was born in Hythe and baptised there on 8 September 1811. She lived all her life with her parents. She had a daughter, Eliza.

Charles Chamberlain was the second child of Richard and Martha Chamberlain and was baptised in Hythe on 28 May 1804. Like his father, he became a bricklayer. He married firstly, on 3 December 1828, Elizabeth Fordred. They had five children. She died in 1840. On 5 October 1845 he married Christiana Weight. He lived in Hythe High Street.

Plot 583 Corke

Inscription Beneath are deposited the remains of Loving [illegible]orke/First Class Trinity Pilot of West Cowes I of Wight/who was shipwrecked/in Rye Bay in a gale on the/night of December [illegible] aged 66 years/and his body was washed on shore off this place/on the 31st of the same month/he was captain for four years/of the RTY Cutter Bittern/and its late owner has erected this stone to his memory

Loving Corke was born on 21 May 1794 in Cowes, loW, the son of Loving and Sally Corke. He was appointed as a 2nd class pilot in 1826, and 1st class on 21 October 1843. He married Jane Colbrook on 14 December 1815. They had five daughters and a son.

On 4 December 4th 1859 he boarded the Swedish barque' Calcutta' to pilot it through the Downs on its way to the Thames. Early the following morning, in a gale, the ship was driven onshore near Camber Station, just off Dungeness. All but two of the crew were drowned, and the cargo, of rice, hides and horn from India, strewn across the shore.

Emily Pexton nee Barber was the daughter of John Barber, a carpenter, by his first wife and was born in Hythe. She married William Pexton in 1851. They had three children.

Edwin Pexton was the second of the three children of William and Emily Pexton. He lived all his life with his mother

Light after darkness

Mary Ann Wiles nee Gallifent was born in Essex, and married John Wiles in Shoreditch on 4 July 1841. The couple had seven children.

John Wiles was born in Stowting, the son of William and Mary Wiles. He was baptised there on 21 December 1817. He became a police constable, posted to Penge for some years, before leaving the force and moving with his family to Hythe. They lived at first in the High Street and later Hillside Street and John worked as a corn factor and a grazier. In retirement, he lived at 'The Hollies' in Seabrook Road. His brother Daniel and mother are buried in plot 590. His sister Elizabeth (Brizeley) is buried in plot 58, another, Hannah (Maycock), in plot 186 and Maria (Baker) in plot 308.

Mary Ann Wiles (junior) was born in Walworth, Surrey, the eldest child of John and Mary Ann Wiles. She continued to live at 'The Hollies' with her unmarried sister Lydia until her death in 1910.

Mary Wiles was born in Barham, Kent. She and her husband William raised their family in Stowting. As a widow she lived in Hythe, in Dental Street, and later with her married daughter, Maria Barber (later Baker). Her daughter Elizabeth (Brizeley) is buried in plot 58, another daughter Hannah (Maycock) in plot 186 and Maria in plot 308. Her son John is in plot 589.

Daniel Wiles was born in Stowting, the son of William and Mary Wiles, and the younger brother of John Wiles who is buried in plot 588. He was baptised in the village on 19 August 1821. By 1861 he was in receipt of a service pension and was living with his married sister Elizabeth Brizeley in Military Road, Hythe. He died unmarried.

After their marriage, Henry farmed at Little Sandling Farm in Saltwood and later near Rye.

William Tritton (1768-1837) was baptized in Hythe on 16 May 1768, the son of Christopher Tritton. He was a first cousin of William Tritton (1785-1843) in Plot 598. He married Elizabeth Harrison in Hythe on 1 June 1793. They had six children, Henry

(1794-1869), Elizabeth (1795-1864), Sarah (1797-1866), William (1799-1838), Edmund (1801-1859) and George (1812-1875).

Elizabeth Tritton nee Harrison was baptised in Hythe on 5 January 1771, the daughter of Edmund and Elizabeth Harrison. Edmund Harrison owned a freehold house and land in Hythe so was entitled to vote in Parliamentary elections.

Charles Tritton was the second child of William and Arabella Tritton. He was born and died in 1811

Arabella Tritton nee Davidson married William Tritton at Addington on 7 December 1809. They had four children, William (1810-1875), Charles (1811-1811), Anne (1816-1870) and Alfred Davidson Tritton (1819-1887). His sister Mary is buried in plot 596.

They had nine children, all baptised in Hythe, Mary (March1799- died October 1818), John (July 1800), Henry (August 1802), Jane (December 1804), Sarah (March 1807), Eliza (April 1809), Elizabeth (November 1810), Charles (May 1812), and Harriet (April 1816). John Horton was a bricklayer, like his father. In 1841 he and Mary were living in Chapel Street, Hythe, with their daughter Elizabeth.

Mary Horton nee Oldfield was baptised in Lyminge on 14 July 1776, the daughter of William and Catherine Oldfield.
